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ADJUSTMENTS

On April 20, 2010 *The Deepwater Horizon Disaster* occurred killing 11 people and injuring 17 more. This disaster has resulted in a massive ongoing oil spill in the Gulf of Mexico that is the largest offshore spill in U.S. history. The spill has extensive environmental impact already apparent on marine and wildlife habitats. The spill has also damaged the Gulf of Mexico fishing and tourism industries.

On May 24, 2010, U.S. Commerce Secretary Gary Locke declared a "fishery disaster" in the Gulf of Mexico due to the economic impact on commercial and recreational fisheries from the Deepwater Horizon accident. The affected area includes the states of Louisiana, Mississippi and Alabama.

The economic impacts from the spill originate in the communities affected by the spill, but then ripple throughout the entire nation. Commercial fishermen in the Gulf harvested more than 1 billion pounds of fish and shellfish in 2008. In addition, there are approximately 5.7 million recreational fishermen in the Gulf of Mexico region who took 25 million fishing trips in 2008. Fisherman in areas closed to fishing, or whose catch are harmed by the spill, feel the immediate effects, as do hotels, restaurants and other businesses that are tied to tourism, conventions and recreation in the Gulf Coast. The reduction in the harvest of oysters, shrimp and other seafood caused prices to rise sharply in the weeks following the spill, which in turn caused food prices to rise in restaurants as far away as New York City. The mere threat of oil is causing thousands of hotel cancellations.

Richard Shelby, a Republican Senator from Alabama, wrote in a letter to Commerce Secretary Gary Locke on May 18: "It is indisputable that the crisis we now face is man-made. If the oil continues to spill in the Gulf unabated, it will not only destroy the fisheries this year, but will adversely impact the Gulf's ecosystem for decades. Alabama's fishing industry represents one of the largest economic engines in the state—accounting for more than \$800 million in sales and nearly 18,000 jobs. We must proactively work to adequately deal with this situation

The Island House Hotel on the Alabama Gulf Coast told CBS that its losses had already run up to \$100,000-200,000 by the second week in May, not counting convention business.

A survey of Gulf Coast hotels conducted by the Knowland Group revealed that 42 percent of respondents had group cancellations. This threatened bust for the key tourism sector comes in the midst of a deep and prolonged recession fueled by a mortgage crisis that caused enormous losses in property values—and thus tax revenues—in many of the affected areas.

The ill effects of the clean-up efforts organized by BP may last long after those of the oil itself. On May 11, John T. Everett, formerly a climate change expert with NOAA who now operates a consulting firm to fisheries and ocean-related businesses, addressed a Senate subcommittee on Environment and Public Works. While he acknowledged "the importance of dealing with here and now threats to our sea-life and to ourselves," Everett warned that "even the oil damage will

eventually heal... The flow of chemical materials into our waters is another matter. There are too many insidious contaminants entering our estuaries, causing genetic harm and poisoning our birds, turtles, and seafood.”

There are five major employment sector’s experiencing economic devastation due to the oil spill. These include tourism, oil and gas, seafood, real estate and government. Federal assistance will be necessary to ensure the continued operations of these employment sector’s.

Even before the busted BP well sent hundreds of thousands of gallons of oil spewing into the Gulf of Mexico, the region's economy was stymied by double-digit unemployment. In April, Alabama's unemployment rate held at 11% for the second month in a row.

In January 2010 Mobile County's unemployment rate rose to 12.6 percent. This represents about 22,500 unemployed people and is the worst reading for Mobile since June 1986. Baldwin County saw the same sharp bump, rising to 11.4 percent. The last time Baldwin was that high was in December 1984, and its rate represents about 9,000 jobless residents. Escambia County had an unemployment rate of 13.9 in January 2010.

Ongoing Economic Efforts

The region is continuing to be a center for international business as well as continuing to embrace the tourism industry. Construction continues on the German Steel Maker ThyssenKrupp Plant. The Carnival Cruise Lines has seen an increase in passengers due to the larger cruise ship being placed in Mobile. Unemployment numbers are still on the rise as a result of plant closings and employee reductions. The housing market has yet to rebound and foreclosures are at an all time high.

The District continues to seek diversification of its economic base and become more competitive in the global economy. The District is stressing the development of the technology industry and tourism.

Telecommunications, information technology and medical research are emerging as important economic development forces in the District. The District also strives to maintain its tourism and retiree sectors in the face of growing competition from other areas of the United States. It is important to develop more of a year-round tourism base in order to take advantage of new, shorter and more frequent travel patterns, provide activities to the growing number of retirees and year-round residents, and develop more sustainable tourism businesses. It is generally felt that there is a need for more museums, cultural facilities, and conference centers. The District seeks to expand its market of international visitors.

The District concurs with current economic development practices around the country and is concentrating more on entrepreneurship development.

The marine science industry has further potential in the international marine and environmental technology markets. The District encourages existing businesses technology transfer of new products from the marine science research institution.

Job training and education are critical aspects of the economic development strategy; several initiatives for upgrading education and training are ongoing.

Financing is another critical area for economic development. Various revolving loan funds have been developed by the South Alabama Regional Planning Commission and the Baldwin County Economic Development Alliance. Many rural electrical cooperatives also provide funding through loan programs.

There is an increasing need to provide a sustainable wage to workers. Research is showing that a growing number of workers are not earning enough to support themselves and their families. There is discussion about increasing benefits, expanding job training programs to enhance workers' skills, and providing adequate child care and affordable housing.

There have been significant changes to the areas economy. According to the Alabama Department of Industrial Relations, Labor Market Information in June 2010 the number of unemployed persons categorized as Civilian Labor Force was 32,452 compared to last years report of 28,949. The average unemployment rate was 12.6 percent compared to last years unemployment rate of 10.6 percent. During the same period, the Alabama average unemployment rate was 10.8 percent and the U.S. average unemployment rate was 9.5 percent.

In June the Districts employed persons equaled 240,604 down from 261,720 as illustrated in Table 1 for 2005-2006.

Table 1 illustrates Employment Data for Mobile, Baldwin and Escambia Counties. This information is from the 2005-2007 American Community Survey 3 - year estimate; American Community Survey; US Census Bureau.
